90 days. Cichorium endivia. Open Pollinated. The plant produces good yields of 10 to 12" tightly packed heads of dark green endive leaves. The inner leaves are very tasty and creamy yellowish-white. It can be eaten fresh as part of a green salad, sautéed, or chopped and added into soups and stews. Also makes an excellent garnish. Excellent choice for home gardens. An heirloom variety. United States Department of Agriculture, NSL 31573.



[ED3-100 - Green Curled Ruffec Endive](#)

90 days. Cichorium endivia. Open Pollinated. Plant produces good yields of dark green curly endive leaves with creamy white leaves in the center. Perfect fresh, boiled, steamed, and garnishes. Also known as Early Green Curled Endive, Giant Fringed Oyster Endive, Ruffec Endive, Green Curled Ruffec Endive, Rubble Endive, and Fine Green Curled Endive. Resistant to cold wet weather. Excellent choice for home gardens. A pre-1865 heirloom variety. United States Department of Agriculture, NSL 6385.



[ED4-100 - Salad King Endive](#)

95 days. Cichorium endivia. Open Pollinated. Plant produces good yields of dark green endive leaves with white ribs. Great greens for salads. One of the best endive varieties on the market. Slow to bolt, frost tolerant, and produces well even under difficult conditions. Excellent choice for home gardens. A 1957 heirloom variety from the USA. United States Department of Agriculture, NSL 6394.
